Cutting floor?

From a sermon by Dr. Robert Rayburn of Faith Presbyterian Church in Tacoma, WA, I found this excellent illustration and want to pass it on to you.

"What is being asserted here is that same Jesus Christ who lived in Palestine two thousand years ago and died on a cross and then, on the third day, rose from the dead – that Jesus Christ, who made you, *owns* you! He made you, he is absolutely sovereign over your life, whether you acknowledge that sovereignty or not. You will some day, with all other human beings, past, present, and future, stand before this same Lord Christ of whom John is speaking, and hear him pronounce his judgment upon your life. Such is God and Jesus Christ is God!

There are a great many people in the world who are well disposed toward Jesus Christ. They think well of him to the extent they think about him at all. They may know very little of what he taught and still less of what faith in him would involve. But, to the extent they have an impression of Jesus Christ, it is a good impression. But John is out to change all of that!

I read an article recently by Frederica Mathewes-Green, a syndicated columnist and commentator for National Public Radio. She was reminiscing about her becoming a Christian.

'Almost twenty-four years ago I walked into a church in Dublin a Hindu, and walked out a Christian. I had had an unexpected confrontation with the presence of One I discovered to be my Lord, and was set reeling. I knew I needed operating instructions quickly, and particularly wanted to find out who this Jesus was. I hunted

up a Bible, a pocket-sized King James with print several microns high, and plunged into the Gospel of Matthew.

I disliked it from the start. Jesus was often abrupt and hard-edged. I disagreed with some of the things he said. I was offended.

But something had happened in my heart. The confrontation in the church had knocked a hole in my ego. I knew at last that I didn't make the world, I didn't know everything, and it was time for me to sit down, shut up, and listen. I kept working my way through the Gospels, and they began working their way through me. There are still parts of the Bible I don't like. But I *like* the parts I don't like, because I know that's where I need to listen harder. [*First Things*, 83 (May 1998) 12]

There is the key. "I know that I didn't make the world." But Jesus *did make the world and everything in the world, including you!* He is the living God, however much he is at the same time and most mysteriously a true and authentic human being, and that is why you must hear him, John is saying, and why you must believe in him, and why you must submit yourself to him, and why you must take him for your Lord and Savior, and why you must follow him. This Word who became flesh and dwelt among men, this one whom John was privileged to know and live with for three years, whose divine glory he actually saw – if only on a mountaintop in Galilee one fateful night – this Jesus of Nazareth is God, the Maker of Heaven and Earth. And that changes everything. Obviously, then, the salvation Christ brings is the only salvation; the truth he brings is the only truth; his light is the only light; for every man and woman in the world.

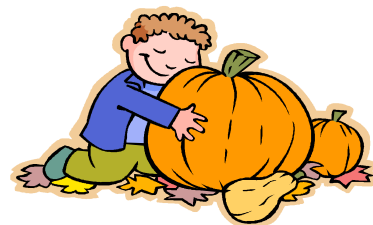

God in his grace provided the honeybee to give us a natural sweetener that doesn't spoil or need additional refining. For Israel the Promised Land was described as flowing with milk and honey. That meant a land with plenty of grass for grazing animals and flowers for the bees. Sampson made up a riddle about some honey he found in the lion carcass. Jonathan got in trouble for tasting a little that brightened his eyes.

Settlers first brought the honeybee to North America in the 17th century. As pollinators they are now vital to our food production. If honeybees ceased to exist today, about one-third of all foods we eat would disappear. So needless to say this gardener is glad to have beehives nearby.

Honeybees are social insects that live together with very marked division of labor. 60,000 to 80,000 workers all know and perform their jobs maintaining the queen and her colony. They collect nectar and pollen and make a number of different products like royal jelly and bee bread besides honey. They produce wax to build beautiful six-sided cells where the young are raised and the honey stored. Each worker bee only produces about 1/12 of a teaspoon of honey in her lifetime but a colony will produce up to 200 pounds in a year. Honeybees will travel about 55,000 miles to gather enough nectar to produce one pound of honey.

Our missionaries also clock an amazing number of miles as they travel sharing the sweet gospel message to those who are hungry for truth. When they are back in the United States we have the opportunity to hear first hand how God has been working through their ministry. Fall is that time of year when your Missions Committee has been busy as bees preparing for the Annual Missions Conference. This is your opportunity to get to know our missionary guests personally so you will be eager to remember them in prayer. Linda Summer and The Agape Puppets will be back to challenge our children in the area of missions. The schedule and short biographies are in the conference brochure. Please continue to pray for our guests as they travel to be with us: Rev. Music Ministry

From the Music Director ----

Johann Sebastian Bach is my favorite composer. According to many music scholars, Bach is the greatest composer ever to have lived! Born in 1685 in Eisenstadt, Germany, Bach was raised in a Christian family. His mother read to him from the Bible every day, and his father, a musician, taught him to play the violin. Not only was his father a musician, there were reportedly 76 male members of Bach's family who were musicians, and over 50 of them were named Johann. . . obviously a family whose creativity was in music, not in the choosing of names for their boy children! Bach was musically precocious, learning to play the violin, and several different keyboard instruments at an early age. When he was thirteen years old, Bach obtained a position as church organist. He worked from that time until his death in 1750, playing and writing music. As an adult, Bach was known throughout Europe as an outstanding organist. Buxtehude, a leading organist and composer of the day, once walked for three days to hear Bach give an organ concert. Astoundingly, Bach's compositional ability was not recognized by his peers as being anything exceptional.

The last job Bach took was as organist/choirmaster for the St. Thomas Lutheran Church in Leipzig, Germany. Bach was actually their third choice for this job, the first two applicants having rejected their

offer. At St. Thomas, Bach wrote the music for the choir, conducted the rehearsals and served as organist and choir director for the services. The music for the Lutheran service consisted of congregational singing and a cantata sung by the choir. Each cantata was based on a German hymn tune known as a chorale. There was a new cantata for every Sunday of the year, so Bach and his choir members were very busy! Bach wrote over 300 cantatas for the St. Thomas Church, only 195 of which have survived.

Bach's personal life was not terribly exciting. He was married twice, his first wife having died. The two wives gave him a total of 23 children, 10 of whom survived to adulthood. He was a respected man in the community, leading a quiet and sober life. About the most bizarre thing attributed to him was the writing of Cantata #179. It seems that services at St. Thomas Church were somewhat a social affair. The seating was based on your stature within the community. There were those young men who came for the sole purpose of flirting with young ladies. And there were prominent citizens who habitually came late to every service in order to make an entrance. These entrances always came just after the cantata, and before the sermon. So Bach, who was grieved that his fellow congregants took the worship of God so lightly and inappropriately, wrote Cantata #179, "See to it that thy fear of God be not hypocrisy". The text of the first chorus reads, "Watch with care lest all thy piety hypocrisy be, and serve thy God not with feigning spirit!" The text of the second movement is a little less gentle, referring to the congregants as being lukewarm like the Laodiceans, puffed up like the Pharisees and full of pompous vanity. Of course, most of the people to whom this message was directed were not there to hear the cantata.

J. S. Bach was a most devout and sincere Christian. At the end of every one of his compositions, he inscribed S.D.G., or Soli Deo Gloria, meaning "To the glory of God alone." His final composition was an organ prelude entitled "Before Thy Throne My God I Stand". There are several hymns in the Trinity Hymnal by Bach, including "The Heavens Declare Thy glory" and "O Sacred Head Now Wounded". His music is exquisitely beautiful and ingeniously constructed. I encourage you to search it out for yourselves. It is most certainly appropriate and worthy as music to be used in our worship services at Midway.
