FROM OUR PASTOR

How old will our church be?

With the first Sunday of May each year, our church pauses to reflect on its past. There are very few churches that make it to the century mark, much less past 150 years of continuous ministry. The thought occurs, though, not only to ask how long has our church existed but how long will it? How old will our church be?

On our recent vacation, we toured a number of European churches that dated back to the Protestant Reformation. Actually the church where John Calvin preached in Geneva predates the Reformation and was built in the 13th century. A worshiping congregation and vital ministry is still carried on there. Another church we toured in Strasbourg was built in the 11th century.

But the oldest witness we saw was in Florence, where the church of San Lorenzo dated back to the 4th century and had been visited by Ambrose, bishop of Milan. Sixteen centuries ago!

So how does a church fuel its witness for that long and from generation to generation? By prayer, proclaiming God's Word, and by discipling its members and children. There is, however, no other secret for longevity.

Once-great churches in America and Britain are now barely attended or have become secular venues. Churches that fail to reach out to those around them will not last for centuries. Churches that seek only convenience may find just that but may not find longevity. Churches that merely serve themselves and the needs of the day may not endure much longer than yesterday's strip mall.

But the church that continues to confess Jesus Christ as Lord—and love him with all her heart—will last. He has promised that! What will we do today to build our church for the next centuries?

That is worth pondering. As our new facilities near completion, may our prayer be that God will

bless this witness for a very, very long time. That is why we give and sacrifice in the short term.

Summer Growing Near

This summer will see much activity, external and internal at our church. While the building is taking more and more shape, we also have outstanding opportunities to grow our faith. I hope you'll view this summer, not only as a vacation time but also as a renewal time and an opportunity for bible study. We'll have many bible study opportunities, camps, and outstanding speakers.

Make sure you have the following dates down:

May 17th is the Missions Dinner: don't forget to support our missionaries.

May 18th in the evening worship is our Spring recital @ 6:00 PM.

May 25th will be Pastor Marc Harrington's Installation service in the evening worship

June 8th will be the Ordination service for Pastor Joel Smit at 6:00 PM.

June 23-27 is a weeklong Music Camp for children and teens.

July 21-25 is Vacation Bible School, and we'll be tying that to the theme of the Olympics.

In addition, following a short break, we'll have Wednesday evening bible study, led by Pastor Brock, beginning June 18 and running through Aug. 6.

You are all invited to be a part of our church as it explores the Scriptures.

CUTTING FLOOR: Stephen Cole from Flagstaff, Arizona made this observation from a sermon on Exodus 35. I am so very grateful for all that Midway folks have given to our general fund and building fund. This is, as you know, an important year for debt reduction. The more we collect and give this year, the better for future years. Might we all not benefit from Pastor Cole's words:

From the Pastor cont./Diaconate Report/Assistant Pastor

“Look at Exodus 35, starting at verse 20: “all” (35:20); “everyone, ... everyone” (35:21); “all ... both men and women ... every man” (35:22); “Every man” (35:23); “Everyone ... every man” (35:24); “All the skilled women ... all the women” (35:25, 26); “the rulers” (35:27); “all the men and women” (35:29). Also, in 1 Chronicles 28:21, David tells Solomon, “... and every willing man of any skill will be with you in all the work for all kinds of service. The officials also and all the people will be entirely at your command.” In 29:6-8, it mentions the rulers of households, the princes, “the commanders of thousands and hundreds, with the overseers over the king’s work, offered willingly.” In other words, these projects required that *all* of the people got involved in some way. David set the example by giving large amounts of gold and silver (29:3-5), but the people also had to give and to work to make it happen. We saw the same thing in our study of Nehemiah. To get the walls of Jerusalem rebuilt, every family had to work on the project. Some of you may have to get creative, but if you ask the Lord to give you funds to give, He can do it. Some may only be able to give on a monthly basis. Others can do that, plus give larger gifts. But we can only do it together.

An adequate facility is a useful tool to facilitate the Lord’s work. We are not shifting our focus from the ministry to the building. It will be an adequate, but simple structure that will result in more ministry to more people. That is our goal. And, should the Lord tarry for a hundred years, who can calculate the legacy that we will leave for future generations here in Flagstaff? Any sacrifices that we make will benefit generations yet to be born.”

SUMMER STUDIES

One of the responsibilities I have been given is that of leading the Wednesday Night Adult Bible Study. The current semester study ends on May 14. There will be a four week break with no activities on Wednesday nights from that time until June 18. At that time, everything will resume its normal course – EXCEPT FOR SUPPER. Supper will NOT be served during the summer.

One idea for an adult curriculum (either for Wednesday Nights or some other time) is to do a bible study on finances using material by Crown Financial Ministries or some other like ministry. If you are interested in a study like this, please let me know as soon as possible.

On a different note, but still in the vein of my pastoral staff responsibilities, I would like to organize into an outreach ministry team individuals who are interested in following up visitors to Midway. This would not be doing cold call door-to-door evangelism with folks who visited a worship service, but, rather, it would be discussing ideas on how to better enfold visitors, maybe making some phone calls, sending out handwritten letters, inviting to church activities, etc. If you are interested in being a part of an outreach team and assimilating new people into our fellowship, please see me ASAP.

**Midway to celebrate 95th Annual
Memorial Day
“The First Sunday in May”
May 4, 2008**

According to Webster, a memorial is something that keeps remembrance alive. For 95 consecutive years, Midway has set aside a day for that specific purpose – a day to keep alive the remembrance of those who have led us to faith in Christ and who have now passed on to Glory.

What does it involve?

- An opening exercise at 10:00 in the sanctuary led by Bernard Nolan, vice president of the Midway Cemetery Association. Sunday School will not meet that morning; all classes are encouraged to participate in this opening exercise. It will be followed by . . .
- The placement of flowers on each grave in our cemetery
- Eleven o'clock worship
- Lunch brought from home and shared with others in the fellowship hall
- A 1:30 p.m. service and short business meeting of the Midway Cemetery Association where an update is given on the care, upkeep, and financial status of the cemetery. Boyd Flynt from the Lost Mountain Baptist Church, president of the Association, is in charge of this service.

Who participates in these activities?

All who presently worship at Midway as well as others who trace their roots back to this church and to the Lost Mountain Community.

What should I do to prepare for this day?

- **First, know that this is not an ordinary Sunday. We will vary a bit from regular routine to celebrate this event which has been observed annually for 95 years at Midway.**
- If you have flowers growing in your yard, cut and bring some to the church on Saturday, May 3 at 2:00 p.m. Ladies from the community enjoy being together as they tie the flowers in small bunches to be used to decorate the cemetery the following morning. *All are invited to come and help prepare the flowers even if you don't have any to share.*
- Plan to bring food & beverage for your family and stay for lunch on Sunday. *Also bring plates, forks, napkins, etc. -- whatever your family would need if you were going on a picnic. All the food will be spread on long tables in the fellowship hall. Eve-*

ryone is free to amble around, visiting and trying another's specialty dish.

- Prepare your children for this event. They should understand “cemetery etiquette and safety”. It is dangerous for children to run through the cemetery or climb on markers. This is a wonderful teaching opportunity – a time when families can be together remembering and showing respect for those in former generations who have passed the faith along to us.
- Participate and enjoy the day's events!

Cemetery upkeep is not paid for with regular tithes and offerings.

It would be easy to assume that upkeep of the cemetery is a budgeted church expense. It is not. The Midway Cemetery Association pays for upkeep and needs your financial support. This association is a non-profit organization founded in the early 1960's with the goal of acquiring sufficient funds so that interest on invested money would eventually pay for perpetual care. The Midway Cemetery Association has no paid staff. Allen Scott has been appointed by the Session to provide voluntary service as manager of the cemetery to oversee the sale and deeding of lots, to stake out burial sites, etc. Our goal of perpetual care can be realized only when interest is equal to expenses. An investment goal of \$500,000 has been set; we currently have about half of that amount. . **To reach our goal, your financial support is needed; all donations are tax deductible and should be made payable to Midway Cemetery Association.** There will be an opportunity to give following the morning services on May 4.

Evangelism Doesn't Have To Be Scary By Rev. Marc Harrington

If you asked the average person in the Church today if sharing the gospel with other people was fun, they'd look at you like you were crazy. Most of us get a lump in our throats and nervous sensations in our stomachs when we think about telling others about Christ. And when we do have those rare opportunities, we're usually glad when it's over.

But does evangelism have to be this way? Not necessarily. We should always remember that when we tell people about Christ, we're telling them something that is fundamentally offensive. We're telling them that without Christ, they will die in and be punished for their sins. But in evangelism, we're also inviting people to experience something of immense joy and fulfillment, something greater than they've ever known. We're inviting people to experience Christ and to be a part of His Church.

What I'm encouraging is a view of evangelism that involves you inviting others to encounter Christ at Midway. We have the opportunity at Midway every week to involve the people of our community in a variety of activities and programs that, in one way or another, communicate the message of salvation to their souls. Another way of saying this is that we have the opportunity to be a part of evangelism by inviting our friends and family to Midway and the activities and programs supported by Midway every week. When seen this way, evangelism is not such a daunting task reserved only for the gifted few, but is a process of bringing others into the presence of Christ and His people.

Some of us have an easier way than we realize to evangelize our neighbors: through our children. Chances are your child knows other children in the neighborhood, at school, in a play group or on a recreation team. These are wonderful places to meet other parents and children and invite them to our Church and its children's ministry, particularly this summer.

It is seed planting time in the vegetable garden. I find seeds to be really interesting as they have so much potential packed into such a small package. Many annual flowers and vegetable seeds are super easy to grow. Usually the directions for depth and spacing are on the package to follow for success. Seeds are also wonderfully economical. Some contain enough to grow 50 to 100 plants for the same price you would pay for one full-grown plant at a nursery. But of course you do have to care for the little seedlings and wait. We Americans aren't very good at waiting but it really can be most rewarding.

As our Junior Master Gardeners learned this year, not all plants grow easily from seeds. God in His wisdom gave many

seeds a hard seed coat so they don't germinate before the conditions are just right. It may take a winter or two of freezing temperatures followed by summer moisture for a seed to begin growing. Or it may need to travel through the digestive tract of a bird before it is conveniently deposited, with fertilizer, far from the mother plant.

The good news of Jesus Christ is compared in the Bible many times to seeds. While it is to be freely sown not all will germinate easily. Our missionaries work in a variety of cultures and what works in one may not be appropriate for even a neighboring people. Pray for wisdom and boldness tempered with cultural sensitivity.

We get such great letters from the field. Here is a quote from **Endi Kovac** that I found challenging. "In **Hungary 2008** is "The Year of the Bible", a good occasion for all the churches and denominations to highlight the treasure that we have in the Scriptures. I am writing a series of articles about the ways in which we are to read the Bible. The central call in these articles is to read the Bible *for transformation*, not just for information. In an age so centered on gathering information, which we can then use, manipulate and apply; and a generation so alienated from the sphere of mutual and transforming relationships, reading *for transformation* is a challenge."

Like our families here there are always lots of changes happening with our missionary families. **Becky White, Christ's College** in Taiwan writes, "I have been asked to step in as Chairperson of the English Department for a year or so, probably beginning this May. I see this as a huge challenge! While I am excited to be a part of bringing good changes to CC, I am not at all the typical English Dep't chair. I'm not a workaholic, not a morning person, not a meeting person. ☺ However, I do believe God has both prepared me for and called me to this role at this time." In **South Korea, Young Park** continues to teach at Hapdong Seminary but is now also assuming the role of President of a reformed seminary in Seoul. **Esther Hunter** is finishing up a school year of teacher recruitment here in the States to return overseas. She will be going to a new country, **Papua New Guinea** (PNG), to teach at Ukarumpa International School. "I'm looking forward to working with these high school kids who are from nearly 20 different countries...for all of whom, their parents are working to get God's Word to the 750+ people groups of PNG." This is just a sampling from letters you can read in full posted around the missions bulletin board.

Please continue to pray for our Midway teams going out this summer. We hope you will attend the Missions Dinner on May 17th to meet the team members and learn more about what they will be doing.
